# The Glass Slipper Myth: Cedar Valley Women Address Gender Equity

Nancy Raffensperger Newhoff is the first woman, ever, to be editor of *The Courier*. She still sounds excited about it a year after taking the job.

And what a year it's been. She began her new job a few months before the Iowa caucuses, when everybody and his brother was coming to Iowa, and nobody knew when the caucuses would be. Not long after the political storm died down, the May 25 tornado struck, and brought a different kind of logistical problem. How do you cover a story in places you can't get to, with reporters who are stranded elsewhere, and communications disrupted? Then in June the flood came. Never mind how hard it was to get reporters in and out of flooded areas, the paper's printing operation had to be moved out of town because its presses were under water.

Nancy Newhoff went to work as a reporter for *The Courier* in 1979, and subsequently won numerous state awards for writing and reporting. She became city editor in 1991 and managing editor in 1995. She received an Iowa Associated Press Managing Editors award for column writing, was named master columnist by the Iowa Newspaper Association and, with editor Saul Shapiro, won the 2003 Iowa Associated Press First Amendment award.

#### Make November 4, 2008 The Day Every Woman in the Cedar Falls AAUW Branch Votes!!!!

**Women did not have the power of the Vote until 1920**. But today women wield considerable power in U. S. politics. Our AAUW Branch can display that power on November 4, 2008 - less than a month from now.

**Do you need to register?** Go to AAUW's National Website. Click on "Election Guide – Register to Vote." A template will appear that makes registering to vote a four-step process: 1) Select your state; 2) Enter the required information;

3) Print the voter registration application on *Adobe Acrobat*. 4) Mail in your voter registration application with a 42 cent stamp. Your registration will come to you in the mail.

**Need a ride to vote.?** Contact your co-presidents: Gloria Tollefson or Dr. Judy Beckman. Their phone numbers and email addresses are in your membership **red** 2008-09 Education, Advocacy Research, Cedar Falls Branch yearbook. At the bottom of the front cover you will also find the **website** addresses of the Branch, State, and Association websites. Use the Association website:www.aauw.org to find your "Election Guide-Register to Vote."

**Will your vote make a difference?** Since 1980 there have been noticeable differences in candidates supported by women and men. The gender gap is driven by policy issues. As more women vote, politicians will be forced to respond to the interests of women voters. Help the women you know get to the polls by taking at least one other woman with you when you vote. Your *AAUW Branch sisters will help you get to the polls if you need a ride*. Help your fellow AAUW branch members make a difference in this election and in future elections. If we develop the habit of voting and help other women to get the opportunity to vote, we will influence policy issues important to the women we know. We have the power to hold elected officials accountable for their votes.

What is the most powerful way to secure Voter Turnout? The most powerful voter turnout techniques use peer-topeer contacts. I am contacting you right now. If you are registered, register a friend. Let me help you get to the polls. Now, you contact someone else you know who needs a ride to the polls. Tell them you know how to get them a ride from a woman in your AAUW Branch. 1) Tell them now. 2) Then remind them within one week of the election. 3) Call them the night before the election and remind them that tomorrow is Election Day. Be sure to call one of your co-presidents if you need a ride to the polls. Let's make this a Woman To Woman Election. WARNING! Our efforts could make voting a habit and women a more formidable vote to consider!

Help make certain that all the women in the Cedar Falls Branch Branch of AAUW vote on November 4, 2008.

#### AAUW at Work for You

The Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF) supports sex discrimination cases by seeking *amicus curiae* or "friend of the court" status. LAF also offers:

Legal Referral Network Referrals are available through a network of attorneys and experts who provide initial consultations to individuals considering or conducting sex discrimination litigation. The Network--more than 300 participants in 48 states and DC--provides plaintiffs and potential plaintiffs with the information they need to make the best decisions about their legal recourse. Referrals to Network participants are provided at no charge and Network participants are encouraged to provide consultations free or at reduced rates.

**Resource Library** Resources are available on issues such as the Family and Medical Leave Act, pay equity, tenure, sexual harassment, Title IX and athletics.

**Campus Outreach Program** AAUW members can receive funding and staff support to implement a gender equity-focused program or event at their local college or university. Topics for campus outreach may include: sexual harassment, sexual assault, equal pay and preparing for the workplace, Title IX in the context of athletics or women in nontraditional fields and tenure issues for faculty. *Jane Close, LAF Director, jane.close@uni.edu*
