

The Case for Ratification of the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) Speakers: Ms. Tamara Milton from Senator Harkin's Cedar Rapids Office and Dr. Augustina Naami, native of Ghana and Assistant Professor of Social Work at the University of Northern Iowa. Ms. Milton will provide an update on the issues associated with the Treaty and an outline of what actions could be taken to support ratification. Professor Naami will discuss what ratification of the treaty means for her native country, Ghana, and why she sees U.S. ratification as important.



## **Human Trafficking Awareness**

Sixty four community members from Waterloo, Cedar Falls, Waverly, Cedar Rapids, Dysart, and Eldora attended the October 21 program "Human Trafficking in Iowa". The program was planned by the Cedar Valley United Nations Association and cosponsored by the Waterloo, Waverly and Cedar Falls branches of AAUW. Three members from Waterloo and eleven from the Cedar Falls branch attended. Thanks to all who participated. It was especially gratifying to see a large number of students there.

Cathy O'Keeffe, Executive Director of Braking Traffic, and Michael Ferjak, Criminal Investigator with the Iowa Department of Justice and member of the Iowa DCI Special Crimes Unit -Human Trafficking Squad, did an excellent job of explaining the various aspects of human trafficking. Were you aware that there are more slaves in the U.S. now than at any other time in our country? Children and adults are forced into slavery as workers or in the sex trade, and Iowa is no exception when it comes to modern day slavery.

AAUW Iowa has joined other state affiliates and branches across the country in spreading awareness, working to pass legislation and in improving human trafficking victim services. Every branch in Iowa received resource materials this fall to assist them in studying this issue or in taking action. We have taken the first step here in partnering with the CVUNA in holding this program. Share what you have learned and be ready to take action.



## The Round House by Louise Erdrich

During the summer of 1988, thirteen-year-old Joe's mother, living on a reservation in North Dakota, is attacked. She is neither willing to relive or reveal the details of what happened to her, to the police or her family. Gradually, she takes to her bed and slips further into solitude



and depression. Joe's whole family is devastated by the attack on his mother. It splits the relationship between husband and wife as well as Joe's close ties to his mother. Atrauma forces a thirteen-year-old child to grow up overnight. The on-going dislike between whites and the Obijwe adds to the questions about justice and vengeance as well as the boundary between childhood and adulthood.

Is Joe's mother's rape an isolated incident, vengeance, or vigilante justice? Did the rape occur on the sacred ground of The Round House?

Located at 214 Main Street, Cedar Falls, the World's Window is our community's fair trade store. Many of us regularly buy our fair trade coffee and chocolate there, as well as jewelry, scarves, books, and a multitude of other types of gifts. Currently, besides buying gifts for others, holiday shoppers will enjoy the many original Christmas decorations, nativities, and unique menorahs that the store is featuring.

The store is run by a tiny staff and dozens of dedicated volunteers, including a number of AAUW members. As with many retail stores, this community asset has been negatively affected by the nation's economic downturn, and it needs the financial support of people like AAUW members. Fair trade stores benefit low income people all over the globe. About 75% of the craftspeople are women, many of them single mothers. When you buy a fair trade item, not only are you providing a person with a fair price for their work, but you are also helping to provide leadership training and community development in many villages and cities where they are most needed.

This fall the AAUW board received a request from the World's Window for a donation as matching money for a grant they were seeking. The board, following AAUW policies, voted not to do so. However they did want to strongly encourage all members to patronize the store and, if they wished, individually to make a donation to this very worthwhile cause.
