Wood's papers and presentations have been published and seen around the world. She has served as Past Editor of Business & Society and the Past President of the International Association for Business and Society (IBAS); past Chair of the Social Issues in Management Division of the Academy of Management; past President of the Society for Business Ethics (SBE). Her awards include IABS Best Paper Award, SIM Sumner Marcus Award, World Resources Institute Faculty Pioneer Award, Leavey Award for Excellence in Private Enterprise Education (Freedoms Foundation). Her recent presentations include the keynote address, Corporate Social Performance: Research and Recent Developments in Montreal in 2003, Global Business Citizenship in Korea in 2002 and Social Issues in Management Division (SIM), Academy of Management in Seattle in 2003. She speaks on social responsibility and global business ethics around the world. As we continue to become more aware of global issues, we are fortunate to have Dr. Wood speak to us on these topics.

Current Research on Educational Equity

One significant difference between the all-boys and all-girls classes at the Cunningham School in Waterloo is the promise that a private fund will pay for two years college education for the boys in the 4th grade single gender class. No comparable promise has been made for the corresponding class of girls. Because AAUW is recognized as a community leader for educational equity for girls, we were asked to consider possible participation in a community project to address this inequality. Several members of this study group will meet in January with members of Waterloo Schools to consider what community groups might do. (The date had not been set as this newsletter went to press.) For most of us, the holiday parties are over, the decorations are coming down and we're back in our old routine. AAUW activities are also back in full swing after taking a holiday break. There are still interest group meetings to attend, projects to complete and very interesting programs at our general meetings. The rest of our AAUW year should be as fulfilling as the first half year has been!

We thought you would be interested in a report on the Focus Group Meeting that was held last December 3. (Oh, it seems so long ago!) Diane Patton and Diane Edwards from our state AAUW board met with us to learn more about our branch and how they can better serve us. It was a very positive and energizing session.

After introductions, they asked, "What do you tell others about your branch?" Answers ranged from telling about our small groups and projects, inviting them to our Diversity book discussions/general meetings to talking about how important life-long learning and making new friends is to us. Then we can get serious about our mission and vision. Newer members said they felt very welcomed and it was easy to get involved.

Next we discussed the strengths of our branch. With 102 members we are able to carry out more activities than smaller branches. Programs at our general meetings are mission-based and interesting. Many members are participating in our interest groups and involved in community projects.

Leadership of our branch has updated our by-laws and strategic plan. We also feel that our programming encompasses many areas. Technology enables us to use our website and e-mail to communicate quickly, easily and inexpensively. High energy and new ideas prevail.

We felt that our branch needs to reach out to younger women still in the workplace and women of different cultures and races. More evening activities might encourage this. We would like to partner more with UNI and Hawkeye and other civic organizations with the same mission. Some felt that a long term project giving us greater visibility in the community is needed. We currently have ten projects but eight of them support other organization's projects rather than giving us a higher profile. Neysa would like for us to become more involved in the educational equity research group. Jane suggested that our branch might sponsor a UNI student group. To do this we need money in our budget earmarked for special projects.

When asked what connections with AAUW we would like, discussion centered on how helpful it would be to connect more with other branches in the state. We would be interested in their programs and projects. We hope to have more members attend workshops at the spring meeting. Longer advance notice on grants would also be appreciated.
