## Perspective on the Glass Ceiling in Government



Dr. Allison Martens Assistant Professor of Political Science UNI

Monday, January 27, 2014, join the Cedar Falls AAUW Branch at the Cedar Falls Woman's Club to welcome Dr. Allison Martens, Assistant Professor of Political Science at UNI. She will give her insights on the glass ceiling and its impact on women in government.

Dr. Martens has a law degree and a doctorate in Political Science from the University of Texas in Austin. Among her research focuses is gender and politics. As well as touching upon the low numbers of women who make it into political office and how to remedy that, she will spotlight newer research revealing the unique challenges women face once they gain political office. What can hinder influence and advancement? How do differences in male and female leadership styles impact effectiveness? In which contexts may women have an edge? What institutional features of Congress may affect advancement for women in political office?

Listen to Dr. Marten's take on these issues as we continue with our year's focus on women and the glass ceiling.

### The Women - to - Women Career Mentoring Program

Would you like to make a difference in the life of another woman? Do you know there are women, some who are young and others who are making career changes, who are looking for someone to provide a little encouragement and guidance as they pursue their college education and prepare to enter (or re-enter) the workforce (or transfer to a four-year campus)? Make a difference by participating in the Women-to-Women Career Mentoring Program at Hawkeye Community College.

As a mentor, you will be paired with a female student from the College who is pursuing a program of study. The match will last one to three semesters depending upon the student's needs. Mentors are asked to be in touch with their mentees every few weeks. The mentor and mentee work together to determine how the relationship will progress and determine what specific issues the pair will work on. Each pairing is unique. In some of the previous matches, mentors have helped mentees network with professionals in the students' fields of study. Mentors have been a sounding board for mentees and have helped mentees think through approaches to dealing with obstacles in their path. Mentors do not provide monetary assistance or tutoring assistance.

If you are interested, we are looking for mentors for this spring semester 2014. Please contact Nancy Henderson at nancy.henderson@hawkeyecollege.edu immediately. Mentors are asked to go through a short orientation session (1-hour) prior to being matched with a mentee. Each mentor is given a mentoring book and guide which provide information about the program. The next orientation sessions are scheduled for late January.



### **Democracy in Action!**

**Legislative Forums** sponsored by AAUW and other groups begin January 31. Attending a forum is a very interesting way to observe and be part of democracy in action. As they used to say in the 60's, "if you're not part of the solution, you're part of the problem," so come to a forum and be a problem solver.

The forums are held at the AEA 267 Building on Cedar Heights Drive in CF. Park in the back and go in the back door for easiest accessibility. About 100 people usually attend them, along with most of our local state legislators.

Each forum is focused on an issue area. Three people make short formal presentations about a specific concern within that issue area. The general subject areas always include those that relate to AAUW policy concerns. Legislators respond with questions to the presenter or they provide further information or updates about the topics.

After that time, anyone present may line up and, as time allows, make a <u>brief</u> statement related to the issue area - or even bring up a different subject. They can also suggest specific legislation proposals and ask the legislators if they would support the idea. After the forum is over, the legislators stay for a while and talk to attendees one-to- one.



### AAUW Burma-Iowa Friends Bundles of Joy Community Action Project

After a slow start the Bundles of Joy project to provide infant layettes for Burmese newborns is up and running. Baby boy Thwang Tha Bik was born in November. A layette was delivered to the family through the USCRI (US Committee for Refugees and Immigrants) office in Waterloo and the parents were excited to receive it. We know of two more babies due in 2014 and will likely hear of others as our project becomes known throughout the Burmese community. The Black Hawk County nurses have been provided with layettes, as they will likely see every new mother in their clinic.

We expect to continue to get informed of newborns through USCRI, Burma-Iowa Friends members and ELL (English Language Learners) teachers. We are also working with the Allen Hospital birthing center determine a way for them to distribute layettes as soon as possible after birth. However, we are limited in getting information due to the restrictions of the HIPAA (Health Information Portability and Accountability Act) Privacy Rule. What we need to know is the sex of the newborn (so that we can deliver boy or girl layette) and some identifier so that we do not duplicate our services.

Our list of needs has narrowed to: newborn or 0-3 month sleepers and blanket sleepers, infant nail clippers and baby wipes. All of these items are inexpensive and sleepers can be purchased at thrift and consignment shops. Donations will be accepted throughout the year and may be brought to monthly meetings.
