From your co-presidents ~


The 2010-11 membership year promises to be a very interesting and busy one as we look back in celebration of the 85th anniversary of the Cedar Falls branch of AAUW and as we move forward with promoting gender equity.

The yet to be passed Paycheck Fairness Act at the federal level is a companion to the Lily Ledbetter Fair Pay Act of 2009. It would require that men and women who do the same work receive equal pay. In Iowa, AAUW is part of a coalition that is promoting implementation of the Gender Balance law that



goes into effect January 1, 2012. It requires gender balance on appointed city and county boards, commissions and committees. There is a new bi-partisan group led by women in Iowa called **50-50 by 2020** which has a goal of increasing the number of women elected to public office at all levels of government. There will be a news conference on the steps of the Waterloo Public Library at 11 am on September 22, to announce the plans of the group. These are exciting times that call for a great deal of work to accomplish the goal of increased gender equity. We all need to be willing to do our part, not just for us, but for the young women who follow us.

Scholarship Committee

The scholarship committee has been working to finalize plans for the scholarship that will be offered for a student for fall of 2011.

The criteria expectations are:

- * A nontraditional female student
- * Twenty-three years of age or older
- * Living in Black Hawk, Butler, or Bremer County

* Transferring from Hawkeye Community College with at least 30 hours of transferrable credits with a 2.0 GPA or better

* Planning to attend UNI as a junior carrying at least six credit hours

* Majoring in a field of study considered nontraditional for women.

If you know of a student that fits these criteria, alert them about the AAUW scholarship that will be available for application in January 2011. *Doris Mauer*

We are supporting UNI student Jacqueline Ingabire again this year. Jacque is a senior at UNI and a refugee from Rwanda, Africa. Jacque is in the United State with an asylum status, having fled Rwanda during the awful genocide. During their civil war in the 1990s she was separated from her parents and family for ten years. With the help of the UN she was able to find out that her parents were alive and in the United States, living in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. With the help of our Iowa senators Jacque was able to come to the United States in 2006

Jacque would like to move forward toward United States citizenship but she needs help. She has worked very hard during her time in our country to learn our language and do well in college while working as many hours as possible to support herself. She is very hesitant to ask for help but it is clear to us that she cannot afford the fees required to obtain a green card - the first step in gaining citizenship. Filing for a green card costs approximately \$930, with a biometric fee of \$80. This process also requires a physical examination from a local physician who is a part of this program. The government estimate for this exam is between \$400-\$500. After having her green card for 1 to 5 years she can apply for citizenship.

Jacque would like to apply for her green card this fall. At our September general meeting you will be able to make a donation toward our goal of \$1500.
