Report From the Board of Directors

The board recommends amending the Cedar Falls bylaws:

- 1. Delete the word 'AAUW' before fundraising in **Article VI. 1. OFFICERS,** Section 1, item **a**.
- 2. Delete the words 'Legal Advocacy Fund' from **Article VI. OFFICERS** Section 1, item **b**.
- 3. Continuing in **Article VI**. **OFFICERS** Section 1, delete the word 'AAUW' in front of Fundraising in item i.
- 4. Continuing in **ARTICLE VI OFFICERS** Section 2 Duties delete 'AAUW' in front of Fundraising in item **g**.
- 5. **Article VII BOARD OF DIRECTORS** Section 1. Composition; delete the word 'AAUW' before Fundraising and delete the words 'Legal Advocacy Fund'.
- 6. In **Article VIII EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE** Section 1. Composition. Delete the word 'AAUW' before Fundraising and delete 'and the following appointed officers'.

These changes will help us use the funds raised for our Local Transitional Scholarship, Community Action projects, as well as AAUW Funds.



Scholarship Committee

Alysha Christine McArthur is the recipient of the \$1,000 Transition Scholarship to the University of Northern Iowa sponsored by AAUW - Cedar Falls Branch. Alysha graduates this spring from Hawkeye Community College and will transfer to the University of Northern Iowa to continue her studies in the field of Criminology. Alysha has been president of the HCC Criminal Justice Club and was highly recommended by her instructor and a community member. Alysha is a resident of Bristow, Iowa and graduated from Hampton-Dumont HS in 2006.

The Transition Scholarship is awarded in the spring to a nontraditional female student currently attending Hawkeye Community College who will enroll in at least 6 credit hours at UNI in the fall. Applicants must have a minimum cumulative gpa of 2.5 or more on at least 30 transferable credit hours from HCC. Preference is given to students majoring in a nontraditional field of study residing in Black Hawk, Butler, or Bremer County.

It was decided last spring that we would not purchase the 2011 briefing book this fall and wait for the 2012 book that is available in December. This will make our materials more current. Therefore we will have our first meeting in January and use the same book through November of 2012.

Gender Balance - Are We Getting Anywhere?

Most of you are aware that a law requiring gender balance on appointed city and county boards, committees, commissions and councils goes into effect on January 1, 2012. AAUW Iowa was an advocate for passage of the legislation that created this change in the law. The law was needed because research shows men dominate on boards and commissions that deal with economic development, planning and zoning, and generally dominate all types of boards and commissions. They also dominate leadership on boards and commissions, regardless of the gender make-up. This is despite the fact that more than half the population in Iowa is women.

Our branch has members on the Black Hawk County Gender Balance Coalition, which has been working for over a year toward successful implementation of the law. Through articles in the newspapers, presentations to community groups, and meetings with mayors and the Board of Supervisors, the Coalition has worked to inform elected officials and the public about the law. We have also encouraged women to seek appointment to a board or commission and provided names of interested individuals to elected officials. Since this spring there has been a column in Section B of the Waterloo-Cedar Falls Courier on the last Sunday of the month in which vacancies (for men or women) on boards and commissions are listed.

Have these efforts resulted in any change? Even though the law is not even in effect yet, we have seen progress. In July of 2010, 4 of 15 boards and commissions in Black Hawk County were gender balanced. In August of 2011, 5 of 13 were balanced (several boards had been eliminated in the past year). In Waterloo, as of July, 2010, 9 of 29 were balanced. In August, 2011, 15 of 29 were balanced. In July, 2010, Cedar Falls had 7 of 17 boards and commissions that were balanced. In August, 2011, 12 of 17 were balanced. Planning & Zoning will be balanced with the anticipated appointment of a woman in October.

Most of the boards and commissions in the smaller cities in the county are now balanced. Jane Close is heading efforts in Butler County to improve gender balance. It is a work in progress, but these data show there is progress.

September Branch Meeting Vote: To transfer balances in the EOF and LAF accounts to the Fundraising account.

The branch has a balance of \$2,685 in the Educational Opportunities Fund account and \$1,100 in the Legal Advocacy Fund account. This money came from branch dues paid over a number of years, and is the amount left after the branch's yearly contributions to AAUW. The board would like to use this money for contributions to all five AAUW Funds, as well as for branch community action projects, and the branch scholarship. We are asking members to vote on this change at the September branch meeting.


