Brianne Stewart came to the board meeting Monday and asked if we were still willing to be a part of Expanding Your horizons in this area. The board voted to help sponsor a conference on Saturday, March 29 at UNI. There is a fee for these girls attending and the board voted to sponsor 10 scholarship for young women not able to afford to pay. (\$20)

Burma Iowa - Bundles of Joy Project

We have another boy!! Jus Ten, son of Sew Gi Ta Soe and Dya Reh, was born January 6, 2014. We learned of the birth from the Administrative Assistant at Sacred Heart School. Since that time we visited the Allen birthing center and met with the nurses, then left one girl and one boy layette to be distributed at the time of birth. The nurses will let us know when they need a replacement layette and in this way we know the date of birth and sex of the newborn without violating the HIPAA (Health Information Portability and Accountability Act) Privacy Rule.

We made an AAUW Burma-Iowa Friends Bundles of Joy presentation at a Catholic Charities Burmese Resource Committee meeting. Several agencies and organization were represented there - Waterloo/Cedar Falls Area Burmese Liaison Team, Operation Threshold and the US Committee on Refugees and Immigrants -among others. Our Bundles of Joy project information has now been widely distributed throughout many organizations and agencies.

Within the next year, as many as 30 Burmese babies may be born and we will need your continued support in order to meet this need. We will be setting up another sewing session to make sleep bags, changing pads, wash cloths and burp cloths. Other items most needed are newborn or 0-3 month sleepers and blanket sleepers (inexpensive at consignment and thrift shops), infant nail clippers (\$1.50 at WalMmart), baby wipes (\$1 at Dollar Tree) and hard page or vinyl books appropriate for infants.

Donations can be brought to monthly meetings.

<u>Nomination</u>--Nominations containing the name of the nominee and the reason(s) for nomination should be submitted to the President-elect on or before February 28.

<u>Selection</u>--A committee of at least three (3) past recipients of the recognition shall be appointed by the president with the approval of the board. They shall review the nominations and make a selection. The name of the honoree will not be publicized until the certificate is presented.

They support and work together to maintain hope and human connections in the midst of their imprisonment. Both relish a dream for freedom, only one will achieve it.
