Branch members are encouraged to attend "Talking About Trafficking" on Monday, February 16 from 7:00-8:30 PM in the large meeting room of the Cedar Falls Public Library. This program of the Cedar Valley United Nations Association is co-sponsored by Cedar Falls AAUW.

It is a follow-up to the program "Human Trafficking in Iowa", held in October of 2013. There will be a brief overview of human trafficking, followed by the documentary "Any Kid Anywhere" in which three Iowa women who are survivors of human trafficking tell their stories. The documentary is produced by the Braking Traffik organization based in the Quad Cities. There will be an opportunity to give a voluntary donation to Braking Traffik, but a donation is not required to attend.

Participants will hear updates on the status of legislation related to human trafficking as well as have the opportunity to share information about what individuals or organizations in Iowa are doing to provide information about this issue.

Cedar Valley Discover Discuss Diversity meets Monday February 9 at the Cedar Falls Public Library board room from 4:30-5:30. This month's discussion is Sue Monk Kidd's 2014 novel, <u>The Invention of Wings</u> examines the culture of women's freedom, their right to vote, and the desire to speak out against slavery. This imaginative narrative is both novel and genuine history of the first two women to dare to take on women's voices. But Kidd goes beyond research to create a riveting and unforgettable climax of Sarah Grimke and her sister's interior lives of these real and invented characters. Dee Lynch will lead a short presentation followed by group discussion.

All Cedar Valley residents are invited to attend the 4:30-5:30 meeting. Participants need not have read the book to join the discussion.

She is currently working for EMBARC | Ethnic Minorities of Burma Advocacy and Resource Center, in Waterloo - the first refugee-led service provider in lowa, founded by and for refugees of Burma. Her parents are from the Jesup and La Porte City areas, and Alicia herself grew up in Jesup. Her dad, Todd Soppe, has been helping build looms with the Women of Burma Weavers Project that AAUW has been working on.

Alicia says that she hasn't had a chance to travel much, but would love to travel more! Her favorite place so far has been visiting some Swedish friends in Stockholm. She likes knitting, reading, yoga, plus volunteering as an English tutor. She is also interested in learning about government and politics. Alicia states that she is looking forward to getting more involved with AAUW and getting to know members!

Glenda Pérez Christensen

Before coming to the United States (2000), Glenda received her elementary and middle school teaching degree from the University of Playa Ancha, Chile. When she arrived in Iowa, she started over with ESL classes at Hawkeye. Subsequently she received a liberal arts AA degree from Hawkeye and BA and MA degrees in Spanish from UNI. In her country, she taught for 13 years, and in Cedar Falls she worked first as a private tutor and has been an adjunct instructor in Spanish at both the University of Northern Iowa and Wartburg College. Glenda's husband, David Christensen, is an emeritus professor at UNI. She has a daughter who is in medical school in Antigua and two grandchildren who live in Cedar Falls (Their mother passed away from breast cancer in 2012).

Córdoba, Argentina has been a very special place for Glenda, not only for the city's architecture and culture but also for the life experiences she gained when she lived and studied there that helped her become the person she is today. Her favorite things to do during her free time include Zumba, creating material for her classes, creating handmade flower arrangements, and gardening.

Karyn Finn

Karyn Finn's educational experience includes a BS degree in athletic training from Tulane University, an AAS in surgical technology from Kirkwood Community College, and an MA in community health from UNI. She has worked for 20 years in research, as a development instructor, and as a consultant in preschool physical activity programming. Simultaneously, she has worked 20 years in healthcare, including 5 years in management in surgical services and as a CPR instructor. In 2014 she was a candidate for Iowa House of Representatives, District 60. Karyn has lived for the past 15 years in Hudson, IA. She is a native of New Orleans and is married to Kevin Finn who is on the UNI faculty. Her children include Juliann (Sr. at ISU in journalism and international studies), Ryan (Fr. at ISU in mechanical engineering and an Air Force ROTC scholar), and Carmen (Jr. at Hudson High School). A favorite place where Karyn has traveled is Hungary for 3 months in the fall of 2012. She went there with her family on a Fulbright Scholar program. Since the family stayed there for as long as they did, they were able to become more than a tourist in Gyor, Hungary (one hour west of Budapest). They visited Budapest, Sopron, Vienna, Prague, took a canal tour in Venice, biked the foothills of the Austrian Alps, hiked the plains, and visited warm mineral spas around Gyor. They also ate a variety of local foods including true Hungarian goulash! Karyn learned how to cook several local dishes. They visited several Catholic churches built in 1300s. Overall, they found amazing welcoming people who are proud of their national Hungarian heritage.

Karyn likes jazz music, gardening, and power walking. She loves to cook, including traditional southern, Cajun, Italian, and Mexican foods.

She is the first in her family to earn a college education and the first female to enter the Tulane University athletic training program. Karyn has known adversity and uses those experiences to keep her energized, breaking barriers, and pushing the envelope. She is a board member representing diversity and health on the Early Childhood Iowa Diversity Advisory Committee and was elected as a 2011 Hudson School Board member.

Elect Her: Panther Women Win

Hooray! On Saturday, January 24, thirty-one young women (and one young man) attended the first *Elect Her* training in Iowa! *Elect Her* is an AAUW and Running Start program that recruits and trains young women to run for student government office, with the goal of eventually increasing the number of women elected to public office.

This AAUW program was initiated and implemented by two UNI MPP (Masters in Public Policy program) students, Rachel Gregory and Kerri Robinson. Topics addressed during the training were:

- The Importance of Young Women Running for Office
- What's Your Issue?
- Making an Impact
- The Nuts and Bolts of Running for SGA
- Campaign Strategy
- The Importance of Message
- Elevator speech and Campaign Simulation

Trainers included Mollie Lam, National AAUW Senior Manager; Iowa State Representative Timi Brown-Powers;

and Dr. Dianne Bystrom, Director of the Carrie Chapman Catt Center for Women and Politics at Iowa State University. Lieutenant Governor Kim Reynolds sent a videotape message. A panel of UNI Student Government Officials – Kristen Buldhaupt, Victoria Hurst, Heather Place, and Beth Sullivan – shared their experiences of running and serving at UNI. UNI President William Rudd welcomed the participants, as did Maureen White, president of the Iowa Chapter of AAUW.

The last part of the conference was a networking opportunity for attendees to interact with each other, but especially with women and men who had years of leadership experience. AAUW members participating either in providing assistance during the conference or mentoring during the last session included Ardelle Brown, Jane Close, Pam Hays, Patricia Geadelmann, Annette Lynch, Dee Lynch, Myrna Sandvik, Bonnie Smith, Gloria Tollefson, Ruth Walker, Maureen White, and Sue Jorgensen, from the Cedar Rapids chapter.

Several AAUW members also met with Mollie Lamm the previous afternoon to discuss nation, state, and local happenings related to AAUW issues.

Pam Hays was the Cedar Falls AAUW liaison for the training; Dr. Chris Larimer, of the Political Science Dept. was the UNI facilitator, and Dr. Brenda Bass, Dean of the UNI College of Social and Behavioral Studies, provided the funding for the event.
