

The Girls of Atomic City: The Untold Story of the Women Who Helped Win World War II

These girls had family members drafted into World War II. Often

they did not hear from them and worried for their lives. They wanted the war to come to a swift end. So they accepted a job in an unknown, secret city, accept ed an unknown position, promised to never discuss their job with anyone - no one, not even a husband. Barbed wire kept them from their husbands and they were required to leave their children behind in the care of other family members.

Some groups of women lived in huts 200 square feet in size with shutters rather than windows and a pot belly stove for heat. This is a true story, told from seven years of research and from collected oral histories of these women. This title will inform and intrigue readers who are interested in women's history and wish to know more about the women's contributions to the building of the atomic bomb.

The Cedar Falls branch of AAUW's Cedar Valley Discover, Discuss Diversity will present this book on March 9, 2015, at the Cedar Falls Public Library from 4:30-5:30 pm in the Staff Meeting Room. The library is handicap accessible. Readers can find multiple copies of the title at the Cedar Falls Library in the book club section. The discussion will be led by Pauline Harding on March 9, 2015. AAUW invites all Cedar Valley residents to attend. They need not have read the book in order to attend this discussion.
