


## Cedar Valley Discuss & Discover Diversity Reading & Sharing

## Be Informed, Be Present, Speak Up!

As educated, knowledgeable women in our community, we have a responsibility to play a role in the decisions our elected officials make every year in the state General Assembly. If we don't do it, who will? Uninformed, single-issue people?

In the Cedar Valley, at the Legislative Forums, we have an excellent opportunity to become informed about crucial issues, to "vote" with our presence at discussions of these issues, and to speak up about concerns – either publicly in front of the whole audience, or privately before or after forums with legislators.

## Immigrant Women

Immigrant women are at the forefront of advocacy for continuing to upgrade our nation's Immigration system. Since the passage of the Nationality Act of 1965, more women have begun to arrive. By 2011, in reality, immigrant women in the US, both documented and undocumented, comprise more than half of all US immigrants. They start businesses at high rates and push hard on their families to become American citizens.

But not all news is rosy. Rising deportments of undocumented immigrants are separating children from their parents. They estimated 15,000 children will end up in foster care in the next five years because of immigration enforcement. Research finds that detention and deportations often separate married couples, leaving single parents, and most often single mothers, struggling to cope with burdens of supporting their families. Human Traffickers often take advantage of poor, unemployed individuals who lack access to social services. The U. S. Department of Justice estimates that each year 50,000 people are trafficked into our nation. Too many women are trafficked into the country and exploited.

Passing immigration reform that includes a road to citizenship for undocumented immigrants, promotes family unity, and provides stronger protections for immigrant workers would go a long way to help this group. As a nation of immigrants, we can do no less. Information from center for American Progress.
