

Cedar Valley Discuss & Discover Diversity Reading & Sharing

Monday, September 10, from 4:30-5:30 p.m. Cedar Valley Discuss, Discover Diversity will discuss *At the Dark End of the Street*, by Danielle McGuire.

Her groundbreaking narrative shows readers a new look at a significant beginning of the civil rights movement. And, this never-before-told history shows a much more complex Rosa Parks.



Rosa Parks is often thought of as an elderly lady with tired feet who refuses to give up her seat on a Montgomery, Alabama, bus. She is not seen as one of two historical figures whose plan for a one-day refusal to ride the buses ignites the 381-day Montgomery, Alabama 1955 bus boycott.

At the Dark End of the Street is an eye-opening account describing the degradation, humiliation, and rape of black women that occurs from the beginning of slavery. It discloses a Rosa Parks who is one of the most radical racial activists in Alabama. She is one of thousands of black women whose courage, if noted by textbooks at all, is often a mere historical footnote.

Maureen White will host the presentation and discussion at the Cedar Falls Public Library in the Hardman Room located on the second floor. All Cedar Valley residents are invited to participate in this historical eye opening discussion. Intersectionality – what is that? Intersectionality is a term frequently found now in literature or heard in discussions related to feminism, diversity, and inclusion. You'll see it in the new AAUW Values.

This excerpt from "Three Musts for Intersectional Feminism" (aauw.org) explains. "Kimberlé Crenshaw didn't invent the concept, but she did coin the term to acknowledge multiple overlapping social identities and related systems of oppression. As women, we are oppressed by the patriarchal societal culture, but there is still a difference in how and to what extent we experience oppression based on our race, ethnicity, ability, appearance, culture, economic status, gender expression, sexual orientation, and more.

Three ways to ensure intersectionality:

1. Confront your privilege

2. Respect bodily autonomy

3. Lift each other up.

When you host AAUW events and meetings, take a moment to reflect on who is not there and why they are absent. It is not enough to include a space for everyone at the table; you also have to invite them to the table and welcome them when they get there. And while adopting these practices can be challenging, being intentional about intersectionality is required to fully achieve unity and equity."

Nouran Othman receives scholarship certificate from Karen Agee, Chair of AAUW Transition Scholarship Committee

Nouran Othman is the recipient of the 2018 Transition Scholarship to the University of Northern Iowa. The \$1,000 scholarship is sponsored by the Cedar Falls - Waterloo branch of the American Association of University Women (AAUW), whose mission is to advance equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research.

Ms. Othman has studied in UNI's CIEP program and has an outstanding academic record at Hawkeye Community College (HCC). At the University of Northern Iowa (UNI) she plans to major in accounting and public administration.

Transition Scholarships are awarded in the spring to female students age 23+ currently attending HCC who will enroll in at least six credit hours at UNI in the fall.

Applicants must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.5 on at least 30 transferrable credit hours from HCC.

AAUW Mission update

Maureen White - Leadership Development

You will notice new wording in the AAUW Mission, Vision and Values when you receive your AAUW Cedar Falls - Waterloo 2018-19 Yearbook. The revisions were adopted by the AAUW Board of Directors this June as part of a new Strategic Plan.

The Mission no longer contains the word philanthropy. In response to a ques tion about the change, Sue Barley, AAUW Board member responded, "Philanthropy became a point of confusion in our mission statement. Outsiders didn't understand why they should financially support us if we would just give the money away. Branches and members thought it meant we should donate money to any cause, especially on the local level. AAUW should be the "cause" to be supported by all members and branches, plus other supporters."

Further, her response stated, "However, one noun – philanthropy – has been removed from the mission statement. Why? While we remain committed as AAUW members to support our mission through our endowed and annual fellow-Linda Morgan & Gayle Wood ships and grants, others outside see "philanthropy" and assume we are an operating foundation. Meaning, we don't seek or need contributions or donations for our work. The intention of our philanthropy is to continue to help women and girls with their education, whether through branch scholarships, graduate fellowships or grants. The noun "education" encompasses this intent without confusing outside potential members or donors. But, our commitment to supporting women and girls continues in perpetuity."

There is no basic major change in giving practices within the organization. AAUW affiliates like ours can continue to provide local scholarships or other forms of philanthropy. The Legacy Circle planned giving at the national level continues as before.
