Are you a young newlywed diagnosed with cancer? Maybe you should talk to someone. Are you an older person who finds life meaningless? Maybe you should talk to


someone. Are you stuck in a cycle of bad relationships and alcoholism? Maybe you should talk to someone.

The sculpture *We Rise* was dedicated at 1:00 PM on Tuesday, December 15, 2020. It's located in front of the Black Hawk County Court House near the corner of 5th and Mulberry. Due to COVID-19 restrictions and to provide for the safety of those present, attendance was by invitation only.

We Rise is one of two sculptures commissioned

by the Cedar Falls-Waterloo 19th
Amendment Centennial
Committee to
commemorate all
suffragists and to serve as
a reminder that the work for
women's rights is not done.
The committee aimed to
commission artwork by
women artists.


Artist Sarah Deppe (shown with *We Rise*, right) received a Bachelor of Fine Arts with sculpture emphasis (2011) from the University of Northern Iowa in Cedar Falls and a Master of Fine Arts, sculpture emphasis (2016) from the University of

Wisconsin-Madison. Her works have been exhibited or commissioned in Colorado, Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, New York, Ohio, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, and Wisconsin. Sarah currently works in Madison, WI.

According to Sarah, *We Rise* is symbolic of the growth of women's rights, emphasizing the diverse women that have contributed and those that are still working toward equality. This sculpture is composed of female profile

silhouettes representing diverse women in both the past and present, merging together all the women fighting for equal rights. The silhouettes of women's profiles are stacked in an upward movement, getting larger as they rise to emphasize this growth.

AAUW Cedar Falls-Waterloo was one of the early contributors toward the \$37,000

Kay Thrall and Arlene Prather O'Kane represented AAUW Cedar Falls-Waterloo on the committee, which is chaired by Maureen White. Barbara Brown initiated the project and was cochair until her sudden death in August 2019.

This Cedar Falls-Waterloo AAUW branch is approaching its centennials. The Waterloo branch was founded in 1922. (More about that in the February newsletter.) Three years later, 36 women—women of Iowa State Teachers College and other women in Cedar Falls who were eligible for membership in AAUW—met in the faculty room of the College one afternoon in March 1925 to apply to AAUW to establish a branch. Then in December of 1925 the Cedar Falls branch was founded.
