Your national AAUW Board of Governance, state AAUW of Iowa Board, and Cedar Falls-Waterloo Branch board support the elimination of the degree requirement for membership. We encourage you to vote YES to better align AAUW with our mission. Opening our membership to everyone who supports the mission demonstrates our commitment to inclusion. In 2021, 63% approved this change nationally, but 67% must vote yes to amend the bylaws. In 2021, 81% of Iowa voters and 86% of our branch members voted in favor, showing how strongly we approve this change—but only about a third of us voted.

Please vote! Voting will begin on Wednesday, April 3, and continue through 11:00 AM on May 15. Look for an email by April 3 from vote@simplyvoting.com. It will contain your ID and PIN. If you don't find it in your inbox, check your spam folder. No email on file at national AAUW? You will receive a paper ballot by mail. No paper ballots will be sent during the voting period.

This year CV3D is focusing on banned books. We thank Anne Schuessler for leading our March book discussion on Sherman Alexie's *The Absolutely True Diary of a Part-Time Indian* with 12 members. On **Monday, April 8**, CV3D will gather in person to discuss *The Handmaid's Tale* by Margaret Atwood. Join the discussion to be held **4:30-5:30** in the conference room at the Cedar Falls Public Library.

This futuristic dystopian novel was first published in 1985 and its sequel, *The Testaments*, in 2019. The setting—a totalitarian theonomic state, the Republic of Gilead, which has overthrown the US government—is again relevant in 2024. Narrated by Offred, one of the Handmaids compelled to produce children for a

ruling Commander, the novel explores themes of powerless women in a patriarchal society, loss of female agency and individuality, suppression of women's reproductive rights, and the various means by which women resist and try to gain individuality and independence.

The Handmaid's Tale has won numerous awards—and since publication has also been banned or faced calls for banning in states across the US and countries abroad. In 2022, the defiant author commissioned an unburnable version printed on fire-resistant paper. Please join us on April 8.

Bylaws Amendment to Change Terms of Office

At the November 2023 board meeting, the board supported an amendment to our branch Bylaws to change the term of office for president (or co-president) to two years rather than the current one-year term.

The board recommends approval of the amendment. Amendments to the Bylaws, except those required by AAUW, must be approved by two-thirds of the members voting. Members will have the opportunity to vote at the **Monday, April 22**, annual meeting.

Article IX Officers

Section 3. Terms of Office

- a. Terms of Officers. Officers shall serve for a term of two years or until their successors have been elected or appointed and assume office, except the president-elect, who shall serve one year.

 2. The president elect shall be elected annually.
 - 3. 2. The following officers shall be elected in even years: <u>the president</u>, vice-president for program and the secretary. The following officers shall be elected in odd years: <u>the president-elect</u>, the vice president for membership, vice president for fundraising and the treasurer.

What is the rationale for this change? First, it is time consuming and difficult to find those willing to be president-elect or president; it takes time to learn how to do the work of the president, and often the term expires about the time a person is more comfortable doing the job. Electing the president-elect in an odd-numbered year means she would be in that office for one year, then would be on the ballot in the following even-numbered year for president. Also, the new terms of office would mirror those of the AAUW IA board and recent branch board terms when circumstances have required term extensions.

Planned Giving to AAUW

If you are interested in making a "Qualified Charitable Distribution" to national AAUW, a four-star-rated charity according to Charity Navigator, from your Individual Retirement Account sometime in 2024, here is information to help you.

Federal law allows people aged 70½ or older to make direct transfers of up to \$100,000 per year per person to charitable organizations (such as AAUW) from their IRA, without the withdrawal being treated as taxable income. To start, first contact your IRA custodian and follow their procedures to request a "Qualified Charitable Distribution." The check sent must be accompanied by your name and address information in order for you to receive a written acknowledgement from AAUW national.

Please provide the recipient information below to your IRA custodian, along with AAUW's Tax ID #52-6037388. Direct your check, drawn on your IRA account and made payable to AAUW, to:
