
And we'll have brunch! Breakfast casseroles, a variety of minimuffins, fresh fruit, coffee, tea, and juice.

### **Iowa Legislative Activity to Watch**

The Iowa Legislature has been in session for three weeks as of this writing. Approximately 553 bills or study bills have been submitted between the chambers; three have made it to the House floor for debate. . . but more will be on their way!

In the next few weeks, be looking for bills coming through on education, specifically, bills related to the human growth and development curriculum with videos of fetal development being required – we are concerned about the accuracy of such videos. There are other bills prohibiting disciplinary action against staff for not using a student's preferred name (rather than their legal name) or preferred personal pronouns. In higher education, there are several bills calling for a study of the programs/majors offered at the regents as well as proscribing general education requirements.

Also, there is a bill, SF 133, that authorizes the provision of feminine hygiene products at no cost in all facilities in the control of the state and in schools. We want to support SF 133.

## **Good Among a Whole Lot of Bad**

Let's take a break for a few minutes from the truly disturbing events and reports in the news these past several weeks and focus instead on the generosity and giving spirit of our members.

Recently AAUW provided the year-end report of contributions by our branch members. In 2024, 15 of our members made donations (several more than one time) totaling \$3,860 for the AAUW Greatest Needs Fund, a national level fund used to meet expenses wherever money is needed most, whether that is for a special project or ongoing work of the organization. The total contributions far exceeded that of previous years. Thank you!

You have heard about our Gotcha Covered. Period. Community Action Project that branch leaders started about five years ago to provide period products for the Cedar Falls and Waterloo public schools because too many girls miss class or days of school due to lack of this basic necessity. Precise data for the schools is not available, but we can infer from the percentage of students qualifying for free and reduced-price school lunches (27.7% in Cedar Falls, 73.9% in Waterloo) that income is a factor in how families must spend their money, some having to choose between buying food or period products. At the same time, Iowa's school funding has declined from an average 5% yearly increase in 1973-2010 to only an average 2% per year increase from 2011 to the present. The governor recommended only a 2% increase again for the 2025-26 school year. This inadequate funding means many lowa school districts simply don't have the money to purchase period products. Community groups like ours help out in some instances, but every girl should have equal access to these basic necessities, the same as soap, toilet paper, or paper towels, in rural and urban school district bathrooms. Our generous members have donated money or purchased pads and tampons. In response to school nurse requests, we've also provided underwear and travel-size deodorant, as well as handmade cloth "period pouches." But that's helping girls in only two of over 300 school districts in Iowa.

Legislation is needed in order to establish equitable access in every Iowa public school. AAUW Iowa's Period With Dignity task force has contacted a Republican and a Democratic representative about introducing legislation. Local Representative Timi-Brown Powers of Waterloo has submitted language for a bill to be drafted that would require public school districts to provide period products in bathrooms, with state financing for the cost. We'll need all of you helping to advocate for passage of the bill once it is introduced.

Some branch members generously donate money for the two \$2000 scholarships we award each year. Others contribute toward the scholarships or projects like Gotcha Covered. Period. by purchasing frozen meals, eating at Pizza Ranch fundraisers, buying items at the garden and plant sale in May, and by giving of their time on these activities.

Our generous members are not doing these things for themselves. Rather, they are paying it forward by contributing toward the well-being of others. Thank you to our Co-Vice Presidents for Fundraising Maria Murphy and Lori Schneider for their leadership and to all of you for your contributions in 2024-2025.
